





C.A.R.E. was recently in The Observer News, featuring our student volunteers. This past July C.A.R.E. had 14 Student volunteers. Student volunteers are unique in that they bring a new perspective, but they also gain a lot of skills and experience that will last them a lifetime. We have three students that I would like for you to meet. Sanaya, Mimi and Travis. Sanaya is our Saturday dogs volunteer, she has been with C.A.R.E. for over a year now. Sanaya helps with taking care of the dogs. That involves spending time outdoors, playing catch, cleaning up and making sure all dogs are attended to. Her love for the dogs shows in everything Sanaya does, from taking extra care of our sick dogs to falling in love with one of them so much that she adopted one of the C.A.R.E. puppies Ivory. Her dedication also flowed to her School where she recruited her friend Mimi. Mimi volunteers Saturday afternoons with Cats. Mimi is in love with all things cats. I spent this past Saturday with Mimi and Sanaya and asked them what did they learn from volunteering at C.A.R.E. and both leaped up with excitement and said Time Management! 



A behind the scenes look at the Shelter

You might wonder what happens behind the scenes at C.A.R.E. and what are donation funds used for. Well in this edition we take a deeper dive into the operations of C.A.R.E. and the wonderful people that make it all happen.

When a cat or dog is brought into C.A.R.E. they are first evaluated by our Animal Care Manager Gloria. Gloria has been with C.A.R.E. for over 20 years and has seen it all. She could tell you some sad stories of animal abuse and neglect. What's amazing about Gloria is no matter the condition that poor animal is in, she always has hope for them. A thorough review of the animal's skin, eyes, ears, paws, coat and teeth is done along with a fecal sample to see if the animal has any parasites. Gloria's initial assessment determines what precautions are needed so that these parasites are not spread to our healthy animals. Unfortunately, most animals come in with a host of fleas and/or ticks. Immediate medication is given upon intake to

remove the pests and prevent further spread. She will contact the C.A.R.E. veterinarian team if immediate medical attention is needed. Every stray animal is placed in quarantine for at least 10 days in order to run additional testing for viruses. During this time they receive care from Gloria and volunteers. Volunteers are given up to date information on our animals at every shift. When known, Gloria provides details about each animal's situation, what brought them to C.A.R.E. and any special medical notes they need to be aware of. Tests pertinent to the animal, vaccines, and a veterinarian checkup is done followed by spaying and neutering if needed. C.A.R.E. works with Boyette Animal Hospital for all veterinarian needs. Dr. Bob Encinosa and his team have been providing veterinary services to C.A.R.E. for many years. You can learn more about Boyette Animal Hospital by visiting their website boyetteanimalhospital.com

Once an animal is cleared by the vet, they are ready for adoption. Photos are taken and put on our C.A.R.E. website and on our Facebook page, they are socialized on a daily basis with volunteers. The dogs get to play outside and a volunteer is with them at all times. The cats have a large indoor room filled with ramps, toys and cubby holes that they can play in as well as an outdoor lanai that faces trees and a bird bath for their favorite past time, bird watching!



This is Ollie he arrived at C.A.R.E. August 16th . He was found on the side of a highway as a stray. He is severely underweight.

Thanks to the generosity of several people, C.A.R.E. receives both financial donations and donations via our Amazon Wish list. Both forms of donations help C.A.R.E. to cover medical expenses, food, bedding, basic supplies such as dish soap, detergent and paper towels. As you can imagine with lots of cats and dogs comes lots of cleaning. A clean environment is top priority at C.A.R.E. All bedding, towels and blankets are washed daily, floors are mopped daily and litter boxes are cleaned daily as well. On average our animals are cared for by 12 volunteers and 3 employees on a weekly basis. That's a lot of CARE! Which brings us to another important person on the C.A.R.E. team and that's Karen, our office manager. Karen tackles all things office related, such as paying bills, organized volunteer hours and making sure each morning and evening shift has the necessary amount of volunteers for both our cats and dogs. Karen reviews volunteer applications and works closely with new volunteers to make sure they are setup for success.

The chart below breaks down where funds are used. Administration and staff expenses cover such items as payroll, office supplies, internet, phone and credit card fees. Facility maintenance includes repair of the building, ground maintenance, electric and garbage collection and finally animal care covers medical supplies, food, and veterinary services.

It takes a great team of dedicated staff and volunteers to run the shelter. At C.A.R.E. we are very fortunate to have these amazing people. A thank you also to all of our members, its thanks to you that we can make a difference in these animals lives.




Chart figures are based on June 2023 Profit & Loss.

Is The U.S.'s Most Popular Dog Breed the Right Fit for Your Family?

The U.S. has decided and the French Bulldog is now our favorite dog breed! When deciding what type of dog would be a good fit for your family, it is important to consider your lifestyle, activity / fitness level, and most importantly, veterinary care and medical needs of your dog.

While Frenchies are very cute with fun personalities, they are predisposed to a few medical conditions that require more maintenance than the average dog. A part of a Frenchie's appeal is their cute baby-like "smushed" faces; this "smushed" face is a part of a medical condition called Brachycephalic Syndrome. This condition includes having a smaller narrowed windpipe, smaller nostril openings, and having extra soft tissue in the back of their throat; Most Frenchies have at least one or a combination of these issues, which makes it more difficult for them to breathe. When these dogs get excited, stressed out, or go outside on a warm day, they have a higher chance of developing respiratory distress, which is a potentially fatal emergency. Fortunately for dog owners, most of these issues can be surgically corrected to help Frenchie's breathe more normally. These surgeries involve widening the nostril openings and removing the excess

tissue in the back of the throat. Your veterinarian will be able to assess your Frenchie's specific needs and let you know if they would recommend any of these procedures

Other medical issues French Bulldogs are prone to include skin and ear infections, skin allergies, intervertebral disc disease, and dental

disease. There is no way to predict which of these conditions a Frenchie will develop. All of these conditions are very treatable but can be costly to prevent or maintain. Pet insurance has come a long way and can help with routine and
